

## **Our School's History**

- 1840: The School started as the Exeter Diocesan Training College, one of the oldest and largest of the Church of England Colleges.
- 1854: the college moved to its current location after spending 14 years in Cathedral Close.
- 1930: the college's name was changed to St. Luke's College Exeter.
- 1978: merged with the University of Exeter to become the School of Education.
- 2001: The School became the School of Education and Lifelong Learning.
- 2009: The School became the Graduate School of Education
- 2010: The School became one of the Schools in the College of Social Sciences and International Studies





# **PGCE** Primary Programme

#### **Subject Specialisms**

Students following the **Early Years** programme will receive specialist training in early years (3-8).

Students following the **Primary** programme (5-11) will receive training in their chosen specialist field:

Art (7-11), English, Humanities, Mathematics, Modern Foreign Languages (7-11), Music or Science.





# Are you man enough to teach?

Traditionally, Primary Schools have a mainly female staff, however this is steadily changing with the number of men taking Post Graduate Certificates of Education (PGCE) in primary education.

This year the University of Exeter has recruited more men in primary than ever before.

As a way of encouraging this trend and supporting male students in an environment where they are currently in a minority, a mentor scheme has been introduced to prepare trainees for careers in primary schools.







The programme has three fully integrated components:

- 1. Professional Studies
- 2. School-Based Work
- 3. Main Subject





#### 1. Professional Studies

The professional studies component introduces key educational ideas and principles within a range of educational contexts.

The component is followed throughout the year with both University and school-based elements and is concerned with classroom issues, whole school issues and the role of education in the wider society.





#### 2. School-based work

The University has excellent working relationships with its partner schools, all of which have mentors trained by the University who are responsible for your learning and development.

You will have a term's placement in the spring term and another term's placement in the summer term.

You will be supported by a university tutor and will come back to the university for five seminar days.





**3. A specialist main subject course** at Masters level forms a major component of the training year.

(Food Technology, Materials Technology, Electronics, Textiles Technology)

• English (with media or drama)

Mathematics

- Physical Education
- Modern Foreign Languages (French, German and Spanish)

- Science (Biology, Chemistry, Physics, Biology with Psychology)






## **Ted Wragg Awards for Outstanding Trainees**

### **The New National Curriculum**

The new National Curriculum will be launched in maintained schools from September 2013. In order to allow schools the time needed to manage the transition to the new curriculum effectively, the new Programmes of Study for English, Mathematics, Science and Physical Education will be introduced from 2013.





### **The New National Curriculum**

Programmes of Study for other subjects will come into force in 2014. The review will also advise on how the new curriculum should be phased in for each key stage.

The new National Curriculum will, therefore, have a greater focus on subject content, outlining the essential knowledge and understanding that pupils should be expected to have to enable them to take their place as educated members of society.
