HIGH STEEL BLUES

Abstract paintings by Stella Tripp

Stella has travelled widely and studied art from different cultures – exploring the nature of art itself by comparing how it is seen within different societies. Making art, for Stella, is an essential part of her existence: her work grows out of her own particular identity. So although elements may be 'borrowed' from African, Native American or Islamic art for example, these elements will have been totally absorbed and reinterpreted to express her own personality and outlook.

Stella's titles reflect the plurality, contradictions and paradoxes to be found in the works themselves. For example High Steel Blues: high steel refers to the steel girder constructions for New York skyscrapers (structure) (with the added cross-cultural reference that the steel workers were often Mohawk Indians and other native Americans). Another meaning of high is elated, which contrasts with the slow, sad blues music (rhythm). Blues also of course refers to the colour. The work makes connections with the world but also revels in the language of paint: structure, rhythm and colour.
